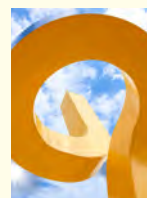
Sculpture Walk

The Future Philanthropist

Companies across the nation are exhausting countless resources to better understand 'Generation Y' or 'Millennials' as they enter the workforce and cause disruption. Their motives are often misunderstood, as the intention is not to challenge current methods, but to better understand their purpose and how to make a difference. This also influences their perspective on philanthropy, and non-profit organizations need to be prepared as this generation finds charitable causes to support.

Non-profits must begin by understanding what motivates this generation. Millennials are looking for causes that maximize their impact, mirror their values and social responsibilities, and provide immediate results. The ability to offer time and talent will become increasingly more important to the future philanthropist. As they build and inherit wealth, they also will contribute significant financial resources to causes they deem worthy.

This particular group includes those who are highly networked in their communities and industries and have a strong desire to problem solve rather than solely offer financial support. They want to use these connections to offer time, talent, and professional expertise, and they

want to do it now. Millennials are often diligent in their decision making; they will research the organization, its stakeholders, and its mission before becoming engaged.

Millennials have strong philanthropic values that were shaped by their parents and grandparents, and these values drive and motivate them. They will seek to create a legacy and continue to support causes important to their family. However, they also will gravitate towards new causes through social media and internet research. This generation values relationship building and often forms stronger connections with the organizations they support. This begins with a hands-on approach, almost like a job interview. Is the organization a good fit for me? Do they adhere to the same values? Can I make a difference here? Connecting is more than just a board or committee position; it is serving in a purposeful way that directly reflects an organization's mission.

Non-profit organizations must start today and try to better align themselves with future philanthropists; allocating resources and creating tools to develop more meaningful relationships. This will increase future success rates by offering millennials the opportunities they seek to make a tangible and immediate impact.

How to Raise a Philanthropist

If asked, most people could readily name several influential philanthropists. From Bill and Melinda Gates to Bono and Mark Zuckerberg, some people are well-known for their generosity.

However, ask the same people what parents can do to raise children to emulate this type of generosity, and the response might come much more slowly, if at all.

The fact is that while many are mindful of encouraging children to help make the world a better place for future generations, they may not know exactly how to do it.

Why is this important?

By fostering the idea of giving from a young age, children can learn the values and joy in helping, sharing and giving to those who have less than them.

Instilling the core ideals of philanthropy in our children's lives can also help them develop a sense of purpose and self. The key is to educate and give them something to emulate.

Giving comes in multiple forms

People tend to automatically think of financial giving, but that's just the beginning—there are many ways to be a philanthropist. Giving personal time or volunteering, engaging in advocacy, or giving material goods are also ways philanthropists can make a positive impact.

According to the Bureau of Labor Statistics' Volunteering in the United States 2015 survey, 26.6 percent of teenagers (ages 16-19) spent time volunteering. Philanthropy is so popular among Generation Z, this generation has even earned the nickname "philanthro teens."

Little actions can have big results

It is also important to help children realize that it's not always the size of the gift that matters. According to the Giving USA: 2015 report, \$264.58 billion in contributions came from individuals, proving that \$20, \$10 or even \$1 contributions can make a huge impact. Teaching children how their contributions, regardless of size, can make a difference to someone is extremely important in establishing giving values.

The more we do it, the easier it comes

As with anything, frequency helps establish habits. Being mindful of tying in philanthropic lessons in everyday life will help children understand there are more than enough opportunities to help—it's just a matter of recognizing them. A few suggestions:

- Share family values and any time devoted to a charitable organization. By making this part of normal conversation, it becomes natural for children to talk openly about giving habits.
- Use allowances as a tool for teaching both money management and charitable giving.
- Promote everyday acts of kindness, particularly for those less fortunate.
- Ask children what areas of concern are important to them and actively support.

Age is just a number, but giving is forever

Philanthropy is possible at all ages—it just takes a little creativity. Here are some ideas for toddlers to high schoolers.

Ages three to 11

- Make a "charity" jar for a portion of their allowance. Let the child decide when and where to donate. Consider matching your child's donation.
- Visit a charity or event, asking the child for input in

selection and planning.

- Throw a charitable birthday party, where instead of gifts, guests bring an item to support the child's charity of choice.

Ages 12-14

- Give your child a charitable budget and ask them to conduct research and make decisions about distributions.
- Encourage children to research and select their own volunteer opportunities.
- Identify neighbors who may need help and look for opportunities to assist. Picking up sticks after a storm, writing letters, making and delivering a snack or simply spending time with someone are personal activities that can make a lasting impression.

High school

- Research and plan a volunteer day with friends or make a long-term volunteer commitment.
- Find out what is needed by an organization, then collect clothes, canned goods, paper products and personal items.
- Use social media and public advocacy through school, church or social groups to help and highlight good work being done by organizations.
- Explore alternative spring break trips to spend time volunteering.

Raising a philanthropist takes time and is a conscious commitment. Giving children the example and tools they need to create and live philanthropic values can empower them in creating an empathetic society that continues to make the world a better place.

■ Mission Statement

The American Red Cross prevents and alleviates human suffering in the face of emergencies by mobilizing the power of volunteers and the generosity of donors.

■ Service Area

While our Volunteers are likely to go anywhere in America when a major disaster strikes, the American Red Cross of Southern Missouri routinely serves the following 29 counties: Barry, Barton, Carter, Cedar, Christian, Dade, Dallas, Douglas, Greene, Hickory, Howell, Jasper, Laclede, Lawrence, McDonald, Newton, Oregon, Ozark, Polk, Reynolds, Ripley, St. Clair, Shannon, Stone, Taney, Texas, Vernon, Webster, and Wright.

■ Funding

The Red Cross received public and private donations and grants from individuals, businesses and private foundations. An average of 91 cents of every dollar the Red Cross spends is invested in our humanitarian services and programs.

■ 12 Month Goals

Over the next 12 months we will heighten awareness of the Red Cross mission and encourage increased engagement by members of our communities in our Red Cross lines of service. We will continue to increase the number of home fire responses by 4% over last year and install 2,080 smoke alarms through our Home Fire Campaign by Sounding the Alarm and Saving Lives. We will also reach 1,700 youth through our Pillowcase Program and continue to teach other community members how to prevent, prepare for, respond to, and recover from home fires and other disasters. Through the Red Cross Services to Armed Forces programs we will offer both emergency and non-emergency services and support to the men and women of our military, veterans and their families.

■ Annual Events

Each year, the American Red Cross of Southern Missouri honors local Everyday Heroes who have made a difference in the lives of others within our community. This

year's Everyday Heroes celebration is scheduled for March 2018.

The 25th Annual State Farm Disaster Services Golf Classic will be held in July 2018. This special outing raises funds that support our local disaster relief efforts and offers participants some fun in the sun.

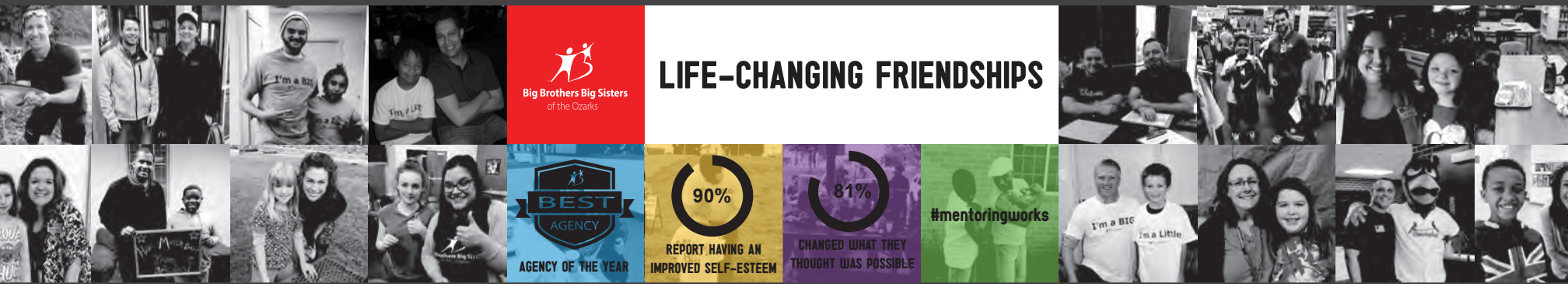

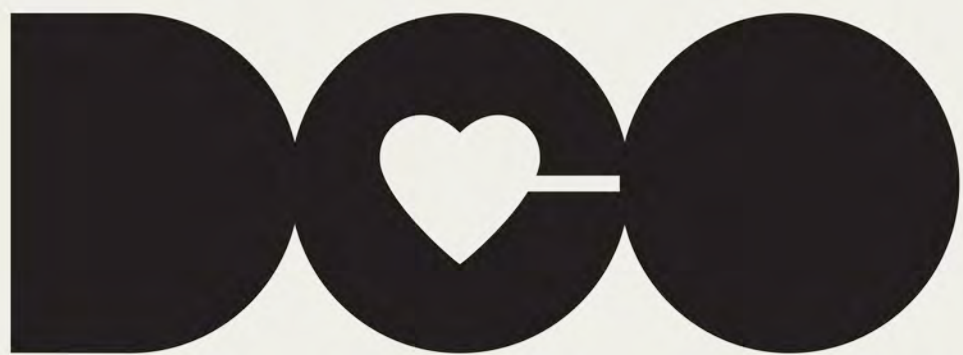

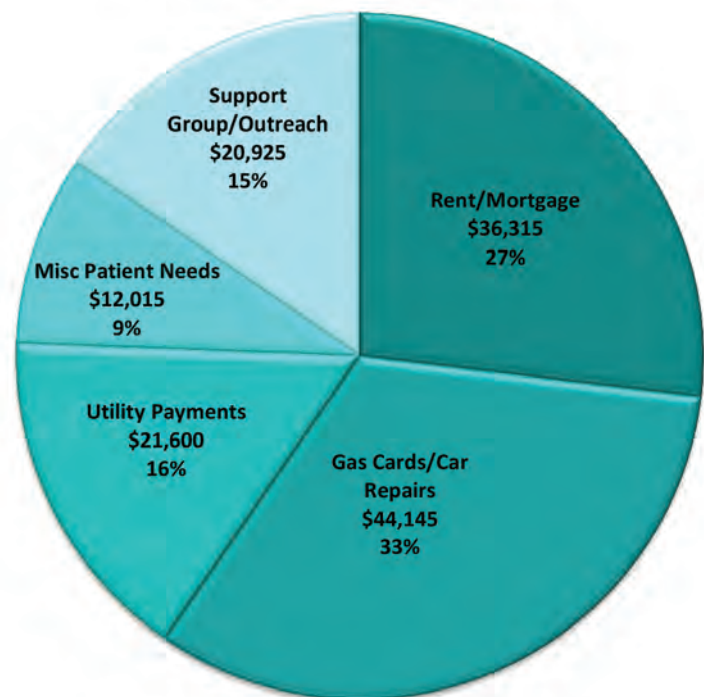

Habitat for Humanity of Springfield, Missouri's model of homeownership leverages volunteer labor, financial contributions, and donated materials. Like all non-profits, we depend on volunteers and donations. Unlike other non-profits, we have a steady form of income through ReStore sales and payments from homeowners. The ReStore accepts donated items from the community, and sells those donations to the public. Our homeowners purchase their Habitat home with a 0% interest, 20-year mortgage and their mortgage payments fund future homes. These sources of income, along with generous financial donors and grants allow us to maintain a consistent level of service to our community.

■ Goals

1. Continue Neighborhood Revitalization efforts in Woodland Heights neighborhood located in Springfield's Zone 1 by working collaboratively to improve the community's quality of life.
2. Build and renovate up to 7 houses a year for Habitat partner homebuyers living at 30-80% of the area media income.
3. Continue to grow our home preservation and repair programs that assist Springfield homeowners in need without the financial means to repair their home. Habitat currently serves nearly 100 households each year with repairs ranging from exterior cleanup to roof repair.

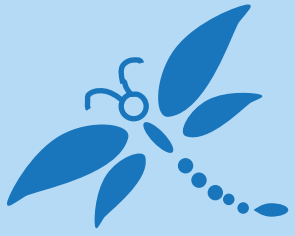

This passionate new leadership group will be focused on widening the network of support for Isabel's House in our community.

■ Mission Statement

Ozarks Food Harvest's mission is to *Transform Hunger into Hope*. As the only food bank in southwest Missouri, Ozarks Food Harvest serves 270 food pantries and programs providing food assistance to 261,000 people annually. The Food Bank distributes more than 16.4 million meals annually. It also grants funding to its member network.

■ Service Area

Ozarks Food Harvest serves 28 counties, some of which have the highest food insecurity rates in the state.

■ Funding

The Food Bank receives funding and food from individual, corporate and foundation donations, federal reimbursement programs and event sponsorships. For every \$1 donated, Ozarks Food Harvest provides \$10 worth of food distribution and services.

■ Goals

Distribute more than 16.5 million meals annually. Pilot food insecurity screening and referral program with major medical providers. Provide additional infrastructure grants to member agencies. Deepen the understanding of hunger and its root causes in southwest Missouri.

■ Annual Events

Hunger Action Month, held every September, is a time when Ozarks Food Harvest encourages the community to find daily ways to make a difference in the fight against



hunger. During this month, The Food Bank partners with iHeartMedia's 105.9 KGBX for Hungerthon, the annual radio-thon to raise money for the *Weekend Backpack Program* benefitting local children. Corporate matching sponsorships are needed every year. The Food Bank's annual holiday campaign is Check Out Hunger. Partnering with area retailers, the public is encouraged to add a donation to their grocery bill at the check-out line. ■ How People & Businesses Can Help

A financial gift to The Food Bank is the single best way to help people in the community who are struggling with hunger. Ninety-six cents of every \$1 goes directly to feeding programs and each \$1 donation provides four meals. A \$300 donation to the *Weekend Backpack Program* fills a child's backpack full of six meals every weekend of the school year.

■ Volunteer Opportunities

Individual and group volunteers sort and pack millions of pounds of food each year at the Volunteer Center. Volunteers also harvest produce through the Full Circle Gardens Program.
